#### Overview

The following action would increase funding by \$10,000,000 in General Revenue in fiscal year 2016 and \$10,000,000 in fiscal year 2017 to The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley for the School of Medicine. The action also provides a rider providing for the purpose of the funds and ability to transfer funds to The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio for services relating to the School of Medicine and the Regional Academic Health Center and also includes a rider providing for unexpended balance authority for the funds between fiscal years of the biennium.

#### Required Action

- On page III-80 of Senate Bill 2 Introduced, within The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley's bill pattern, increase the General Revenue appropriation in Strategy C.4.1., School of Medicine by \$10,000,000 in General Revenue in fiscal year 2016 and \$10,000,000 in General Revenue in fiscal year 2017.
- 2. Strike Rider 5 on page III-83 and substitute the following new rider.

Appropriations in Support of the School of Medicine and the Regional Academic Health Center (RAHC). Included in appropriations above to The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley in Strategy C.4.1, School of Medicine, is \$25,698,950 in fiscal year 2016 and \$25,698,950 in fiscal year 2017 to support the establishment, operation, or administration of a medical school and the Regional Academic Health Center. Notwithstanding Article III. Special Provisions Relating Only to State Agencies of Higher Education, Sec. 4 Transfer Provisions of this Act, The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley may transfer appropriations to The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio from Strategy C.4.1, School of Medicine in an amount not to exceed \$15,698,950 in fiscal year 2016 and \$15,698,950 in fiscal year 2017, to be used for services related to the Regional Academic Health Center or the medical school.

For purposes of the requirements of Article IX, Sec. 6.08 Benefits Proportional by Fund of this Act, appropriations made to The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley and transferred to The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio to be used for services related to the Regional Academic Health Center or the medical school shall be counted as if the transferred funds were directly appropriated to The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio.

3. Strike Rider 6 on page III-83 and substitute the following new rider.

<u>Unexpended Balances Between Fiscal Years: School of Medicine.</u> Any unexpended balances as of August 31, 2016, from the appropriations identified in Strategy C.4.1, School of Medicine, are hereby appropriated to The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley for the same purpose for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 2016.

#### University of Texas Health Science Center at Tyler Mental Health Workforce Training Programs

Purpose: The 83rd Texas Legislature invested resources into expanded mental health services, but finding mental health providers in small cities and rural areas is particularly difficult. In some communities, the ration of people to mental health providers is 25,000:1, seven times the statewide average.

- 85,000 individuals in the region have a serious mental illness
- 113,000 need treatment for substance abuse
- The region has a suicide rate that is 65% higher than the statewide average

These workforce shortages negatively impact two state mental health facilities - Rusk State Hospital and Terrell State Hospital - as well as the local mental health authorities, local hospitals and other mental health facilities.

UTHSCT has a successful record training medical professional and retaining those providers in underserved areas. They believe they can have similar success in training mental health providers for underserved areas. The funding will be used to support mental health workforce training programs in underserved areas.

#### Required Action:

On page III-177 of the bill pattern for the University of Texas Health Science Center at Tyler, add the following new rider:

Mental Health Workforce Training for Underserved Areas. In addition to amounts appropriated elsewhere in this Act, General Revenue funds in the amount of \$4,000,000 for Fiscal Year 2016 and \$4,000,000 for Fiscal Year 2017 are hereby appropriated to the University of Texas Health Science Center at Tyler to support mental health workforce training programs in underserved areas including but not limited to Rusk State Hospital and Terrell State Hospital.

The following action would increase funding by \$5,000,000 in General Revenue in fiscal year 2016 and \$5,000,000 in fiscal year 2017 to Texas A&M University Health Science Center for a partnership with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service to reduce preventable diseases and their consequences in South Texas by 25 percent by the year 2025. This initiative will provide evidence-based education, monitoring, and interventions to prevent disease and improve public health through an integrated Texas A&M Institute for Public Health Improvement (IPHI) in South Texas. The A&M IPHI will focus on the highest impact diseases in the region, including diabetes, asthma, and infectious disease, with the potential to save the state tens of millions in health care costs annually.

### Texas A&M Health Science Center Forensic Nursing

#### Overview

The following action adds \$1,000,000 in Fiscal Year 2016 and \$1,000,000 in Fiscal Year 2017 for Texas A&M Health Science Center's creation of the first Department of Forensic Nursing in Texas. Forensic nurses specialize in health examinations and criminal evidence collection from live victims under evaluation and in acute care clinics. The objective of this program, to be led by the Texas A&M College of Nursing, is to build a statewide capability in clinical forensic excellence by generating nursing professionals who are experts in evidence collection, thus leading to improved ability to prosecute criminals and reduce certain crimes in Texas. This program will provide specialized training of nurses in sexual assault, domestic violence, child abuse and neglect, elder mistreatment, death investigation, corrections, and nursing in the aftermath of mass disasters.

#### Required Action

On page III-183 of Texas A&M University System Health Science Center's bill pattern, add General Revenue in the amount of \$1,000,000 in FY 2016 and \$1,000,000 in FY 2017 in a newly created strategy entitled Strategy E.x.x. Forensic Nursing.
