HR 6201 was signed into law on March 18, 2020, and provided approximately \$3.5 billion. The bill included assistance for the increased demands on the medical field including supplies, personal protective equipment, and supplies; waivers and funding for certain nutrition programs, like the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP); and employment assistance, including unemployment assistance.

Notes:

- Amounts reflected above are as of February 28, 2022, as reported by state agencies and institutions of higher education. Amounts are subject to change based on final awards, expenditures, and obligations between reporting periods. Awards sent directly to locals from federal agencies are not included in this report.
- Missing information was not available at the time of current survey ending February 28, 2022.
- Public Assistance grants are awarded by federal reimbursements. The Texas Division of Emergency Management is the state administrator. Due to the nature of the awards, TDEM pass throughs and state agencies reporting awards received may be recorded differently due to the timing of applications and reimbursements.
