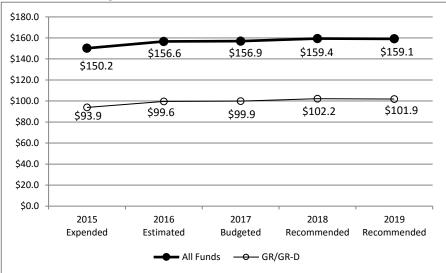

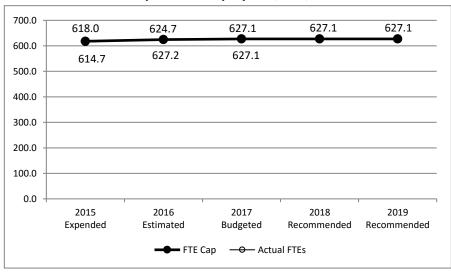

### Judiciary Section, Comptroller's Department Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - House

- 1. Biennialize Funding for Court and Prosecutor Changes Due to Enactment of Senate Bill 1139, Eighty-fourth Legislature, 2015
  Recommendations biennialize funding for the following:
  - a. **District Courts:** an increase of \$420,000 in All Funds (\$119,700 in General Revenue and \$90,300 from the Judicial Fund No. 573 Other Funds) to biennialize costs for one new court that was established January 1, 2016 (the 507th Judicial District in Harris County) and two new courts that will be established January 1, 2017 (the 451st Judicial District in Kendall County and the 440th Judicial District in Coryell County).
  - b. **Statutory County Judge Salary Supplements:** an increase of \$196,000 in All Funds (\$21,560 in General Revenue and \$174,440 from the Judicial Fund No. 573 Other Funds) to biennialize costs for the creation of four new statutory county courts and the abolishment of one statutory county court. County Court at Law No. 5 in Fort Bend County and County Criminal Court at Law No. 16 in Harris County were established January 1, 2016. County Court at Law No. 4 in Cameron County is established and the Kendall County Court at Law No. 5 in Cameron County is established January 1, 2017. County Court at Law No. 5 in Cameron County is established January 1, 2018.
  - c. Prosecutor Changes: a decrease of \$30,000 in General Revenue to biennialize costs for:
    - a. Abolishment and removal of the state prosecutor for the 25th Judicial District (Guadalupe, Gonzales, and Lavaca Counties) from the Professional Prosecutors Act effective January 1, 2017;
    - b. Addition of the Criminal District Attorney for the 451st Judicial District (Kendall County) to the Professional Prosecutors Act and abolishment of the Kendall County Attorney position effective January 1, 2017; and
    - c. Addition of the county attorney performing the duties of a district attorney in Guadalupe County to the Professional Prosecutors List effective January 1, 2017.
  - d. 1st Multicounty Court at Law: an increase of \$112,000 in Judicial Fund No. 573 Other Funds to compensate the administrative county of the multicounty court at law at 100 percent of a district judge's salary, or \$140,000 (See also, Rider Highlights #9).
- 2. **Montgomery County, 435th Judicial District:** Recommendations eliminate funding for the 435th District Court Strategy to align with the court's reduced responsibilities due to enactment of Senate Bill 746, Eighty-fourth Legislature, Regular Session, that removed the court's special jurisdiction over civil commitments. For the 2016–17 biennium, the court's responsibilities were related to biennial reviews of civil commitments for those persons committed in the 435th District Court for prior years. Costs associated with these responsibilities will be paid for by Montgomery County for the 2018–19 biennium and beyond.
- 3. **Constitutional County Judge Salary Supplement:** Recommendations include consolidation of two Constitutional County Judge Supplement strategies (C.1.1 and C.1.2) into one strategy, Strategy C.1.1, Constitutional County Judge Supplement, to reflect changes made with the enactment of Senate Bill 1025, Eighty-fourth Legislature, Regular Session, that increased the county judge salary supplement where 40 percent of the judge's functions are judicial from \$15,000 to 18 percent of a district judge's state salary of \$140,000, or \$25,200. The prior two strategy configuration reflected two different Methods of Finance (General Revenue and the Judicial Fund No. 573) for the Supplement. For the 2016–17 biennium, the Judiciary Section was appropriated \$2.1 million in General Revenue each year for this purpose. Recommendations continue 2016–17 funding levels for the 2018–19 biennium.
- 4. **Public Integrity Prosecution Grants:** Recommendations continue \$250,000 in General Revenue to defray expenses of local prosecutors in the investigation and prosecution of offenses against public administration due to the enactment of House Bill 1690, Eighty-fourth Legislature, Regular Session. Pursuant to the enacted legislation, the Comptroller is required to reimburse counties through grants distributed by the Judiciary Section for the costs of local prosecution, including witness travel expenses, upon a county request. No county has yet requested these funds as of October, 2016 and the Judiciary Section is not aware of any upcoming requests by a county.

- 5. **Judicial Fund No. 573:** Recommendations continue \$22.5 million in General Revenue drawn down by the Judiciary Section in the 2016–17 biennium to replace unavailable Judicial Fund 573 revenues and fund balances for statutorily required compensation to trial judges and local prosecutors through its estimated appropriation authority. Although recommendations in 2018–19 anticipates Judicial Fund collections being sufficient to cover related payroll costs, the Judiciary Section will continue to need estimated appropriation authority from General Revenue to cover any possible shortfall.
- 6. **Judicial Compensation Commission (JCC)**: The Judicial Compensation Commission is recommending a 10.2 percent increase in judicial salaries for the 2018–19 biennium. This would increase the state salary of a district judge from \$140,000 to \$154,280. A review of JCC recommendations for judicial salaries and other positions with salaries that are statutorily linked to a district judges salary, and the Commission's other recommendations is available on page 4. The most recent judicial salary adjustment was a 12 percent increase in the 2014–15 biennium for judge and prosecutor positions linked to district judge pay totaling \$34.8 million across the 2014–15 biennium (See also, Judicial and Prosecutor Salaries and Salary Supplements Statutorily Linked to District Judge Pay House).
- 7. **Special Prosecution Unit (SPU):** Recommendations continue \$10.2 million for the Special Prosecution Unit, Walker County. Recommendations reduce SPU funding by \$0.3 million pursuant to the submitted 4 percent reduction. This includes:
  - \$120,000 within the Criminal Division which includes
    - \$6,756 for the Executive Director's Salary and Benefits
    - \$16,980 for Expert Witness Fees, Court Reporters, and other Professional Services
    - \$5,274 for storage rental
    - \$30,990 for Other Operating Expenses
    - o \$60,000 for vehicles
  - \$120,106 within the Civil Division for Expert Witness Fees
  - \$60,000 within the Juvenile Division which includes
    - o \$23,358 for Expert Witness Fees, Court Reporter Fees, and Janitorial Services
    - o \$4,000 for office supplies
    - o \$12,000 for rental space
    - o \$20,642 for operating expenses

8. **State Fraud Unit**: Recommendations provide \$4.8 million in General Revenue and General Revenue Fund 8042 - Insurance Company Maintenance Tax and Insurance Department Fees funding for the Travis County District Attorney's office to establish a State Fraud Unit that would investigate and prosecute tax and insurance fraud cases against the state through a new strategy, D.1.10, Fraud Investigations. Funding allocations to each of the State Fraud Unit's divisions is provided in a new Rider 11, Fraud Investigations (See also, Rider Highlights - House #11).

#### **Additional JCC Recommendations:**

- 1) Enact legislation requiring the Judicial Compensation Commission's salary recommendations be listed in the introduced version of the General Appropriations Act filed in the House and the Senate.
- 2) Reduce the number of years required to receive judicial longevity pay from sixteen years of service to two years of service and to provide the judge or justice 0.2 percent of their currently monthly state salary for every year of judicial service. If the 10.2 percent salary increase is authorized then the cost of this recommendation would be \$2.8 million for the 2018-19 biennium and the cost would be \$2.5 million if the 10.2 percent were not implemented.
- 3) Fund an increase in the salaries of the Children's Court Associate Judges within the Office of Court Administration at 90 percent of a district judge's salary at a cost of \$3.3 million for the 2018-19 biennium if the 10.2 percent salary increase is authorized.
- 4) Delink the pension benefits of state officers and employees currently linked to the salary of a district judge.

#### Notes:

1) The Judicial Branch Certification Commission estimates that the state fiscal impact of a 10.2 percent judicial salary increase is approximately \$43.8 million for the 2018-19 biennium.

#### Footnotes:

1) Enactment of House Bill 9, Eighty-fourth Legislature, Regular Session, 2015, increased member contributions to the Employees Retirement System. Appropriations for the 2016–17 biennium include \$1.3 million in General Revenue Funds provided as grants to counties to provide prosecutors with local compensation to offset costs of increased member contributions.

#### **Modification of Existing Riders**

- 3. Special Prosecution Unit: Appropriation Source, Unexpended Balances, and Performance Reporting. Recommendations update the rider to reflect reductions made by the agency that were included in its 4 percent reduction (See also, Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues #7 and Items Not Included in Recommendations, Agency Exceptional Items Not Included #1)
- 9. **Nolan, Fisher, and Mitchell Counties 1st Multicounty Court at Law.** Recommendations update the rider to reflect changes resulting from enactment of Senate Bill 1139, Eighty-fourth Legislature, that include an increase in the compensation of the 1st Multicounty Court at Law judge from \$84,000 to the state salary of a district court judge, or \$140,000, and removal of the county names due to Mitchell County being removed from the Multicounty Court at Law in fiscal year 2019 (See also, Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues #1b)
- 10. **Grants to Counties Contingent on House Bill 9.** Recommendations modify the rider title and text by removing contingency language related to enactment of House Bill 9, Eighty-fourth Legislature, 2015.

#### **New Riders**

11. **Fraud Investigations.** Recommendations add a new rider allocating \$2,417,214 in General Revenue for general state government investigations and \$2,417,124 in General Revenue Fund – Insurance Companies Maintenance Tax and Insurance Department Fees for insurance fraud investigations for the 2018–19 biennium for the State Fraud Unit within the Travis County District Attorney's Office. The rider specifies that no funds appropriated can be used by the county for housing the unit and grants unexpended balance authority within the biennium. Travis County is required to submit a report each January to the Legislative Budget Board and the Office of the Governor that includes annual statistical information on fraud investigations conducted by the State Fraud Unit.
