


Health Professions Council (HPC) is funded entirely by Interagency Contracts with agencies participating in HPC's shared services.

Health Professions Council Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - House

- 1. Modifications to Sec. 3, Funding for Health Professions Council in Special Provisions Relating to All Regulatory Agencies. Recommendations amend Section 3, Funding for Health Professions Council in Special Provisions Relating to All Regulatory Agencies to include a breakdown of the Health Professions Council's (HPC) budget by function and by participating agency. The modifications to the rider increase transparency in the costs of each function and services provided to each participating agency.
- 2. Data Center Services Cost. Health Professions Council recently transitioned from using data center services through the Department of Information Resources (DIR) in July 2016 and is now supported by a vendor, Micropact. The agency was granted capital budget authority and \$202,930 in funding for Data Center Consolidation in the 2016-17 biennium. DIR initially estimated the agency would need \$165,776 for the 2018-19 biennium in ongoing costs for data center services through DIR.

Recommendations provide capital budget authority and \$165,776 in funding for data center services for the 2018-19 biennium in accordance with DIR estimates. This resulted in a net decrease of \$37,154 from the agency's 2016-17 base amount (See Rider Highlights #2 and Items Not Included #1).

3. Total Funding Allocation for Member Agencies. Recommendations include funding for Health Professions Council with a net decrease of \$63,154 for a reduction in administrative costs and data center services (See Selected Fiscal and Policy Issue #2) and a reallocation between agency functions due to the reallocation of an FTE from Information Technology Shared Services to support the Database. Member agencies agree to the defined services provided and their respective share of costs for the services prior to the submission of HPC's Legislative Appropriations Request and a breakdown of funding by HPC function is included below.
