



Office of Public Utility Counsel Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - House

1. **Background and Four Percent Reduction.** The Office of Public Utility Counsel represents Texas' residential and small commercial consumers in rate cases, rulemakings, and projects involving electric, telecommunications, and water utilities in order to protect consumer interests. The agency's workload has historically been largely dictated by the number of rate cases brought before the Public Utility Commission (PUC) and the number of projects or rulemakings initiated by PUC or required of it by the legislature. In fiscal year 2016, the agency participated in 45 utility cases and 29 utility projects, and is projecting to participate in 35 cases and 26 projects in each year of the 2018-19 biennium. Pursuant to the four percent reduction, the agency will reduce the use of outside experts in cases and projects and plans to rely on existing capacity in the 2018-19 biennium at the recommended level of funding.

a) To accommodate fluctuations in its case and project load, the Office of Public Utility Counsel's FTE cap has historically been higher than its actual FTE levels and salary expenditures to allow for funding of temporary outside experts or hiring of additional FTEs as needed by the agency. The recommendations retain the cap at 25.5 FTEs. The agency reports that should the number of cases and projects substantially increase, it would reduce the use of outside experts rather than reduce FTEs or its participation in cases and projects.
