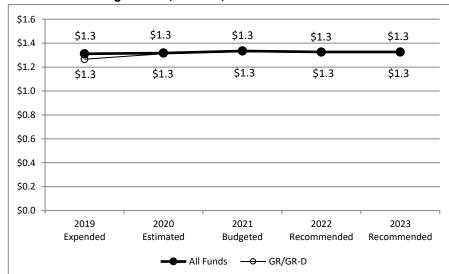

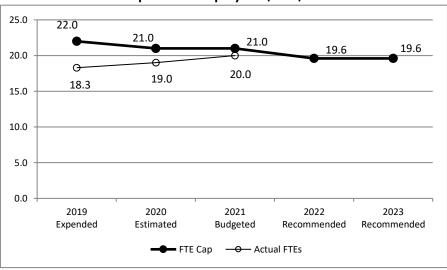

## Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - House

- 1. **Sunset Review.** The agency is currently under a limited scope Sunset review and will be abolished on September 1, 2021, unless continued by the Eighty-seventh Legislature, 2021. The Sunset Advisory Commission Staff Report with findings and recommendations was published in November 2020. The Sunset Staff review found that the state has a continuing need to regulate veterinary medicine and the agency should be continued. However, the report also found the agency continues to have issues with data collection, tracking, and analysis, and delayed replacement of the agency's legacy database system. In January 2021, the Sunset Advisory Commission adopted the Sunset Staff recommendation to continue the agency for eight years, until 2029, to coincide with the Sunset review of other prescribing and dispensing boards. Additionally, the commission adopted recommendations to require the agency to undergo a special purpose Sunset review during the 2022–23 biennium to review the agency's implementation of its database system and the agency's processes and procedures for data collection and analysis.
- 2. **Strategic Fiscal Review.** The agency is currently under Sunset review, and as a result is subject to the Strategic Fiscal Review process outlined in Senate Bill 68, Eighty-sixth Legislature, 2019. Historical program and financial information was collected and analyzed to inform the budget process. Significant findings are outlined in the report, but highlights include:
  - The agency experienced significant turnover in key positions following Sunset review in the 2016–17 biennium, including the Chief Financial Officer (CFO) position.
  - Three programs reviewed (excluding Indirect Administration) have strong statutory authority: Licensing, Enforcement, and Peer Assistance.
  - The agency's Licensing and Enforcement programs have strong mission centrality, and the Peer Assistance program has moderate mission centrality.

The agency's CFO position was vacant during most of fiscal year 2020, but the agency filled the position at the end of the fiscal year.

## **Modification of Existing Riders**

1. **Performance Measure Targets.** Recommendations add a new Output measure, *Number of Compliance Inspections*, for Strategy A.2.1, Complaints and Action, with a target of 750 each fiscal year. This measure was previously a non-key performance measure in the agency's Strategic Plan.

#### **New Riders**

2. **Sunset Contingency.** Recommendations add a contingency provision for the agency's upcoming Sunset review to make the agency's appropriations for fiscal year 2023 contingent on the continuation of the agency by the Eighty-seventh Legislature, Regular Session, 2021. If the agency is not continued, then rider would authorize the use of the agency's fiscal year 2022 appropriations for the phase out of agency operations. (See Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues #1.)

- c) The State Auditor's Office Report, Executive Compensation at State Agencies (Report 20-706, August 2020), indicates a market average salary of \$119,262 for the Executive Director position at the Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners. The agency is not requesting any changes to its exempt position.
