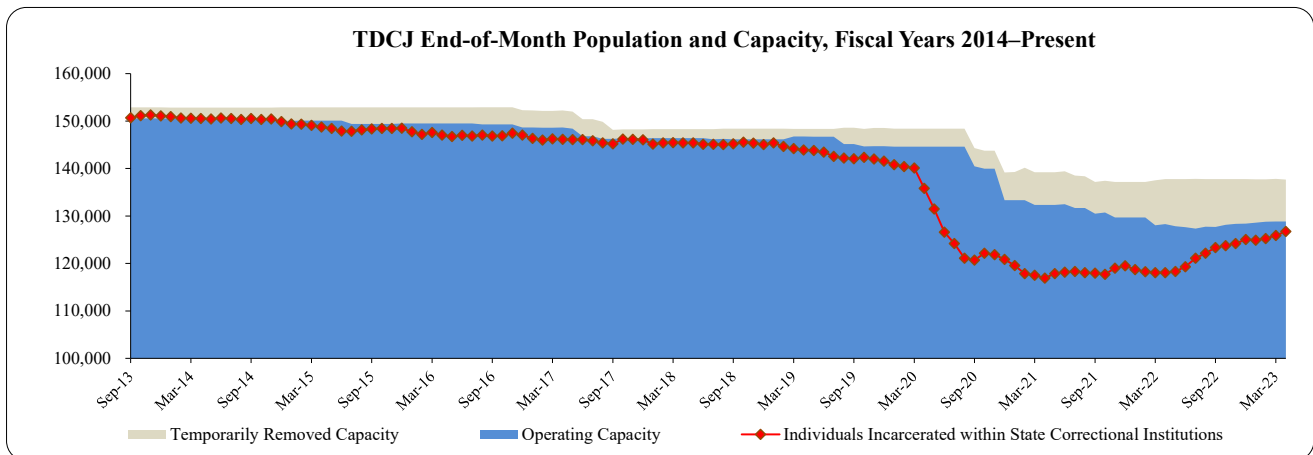
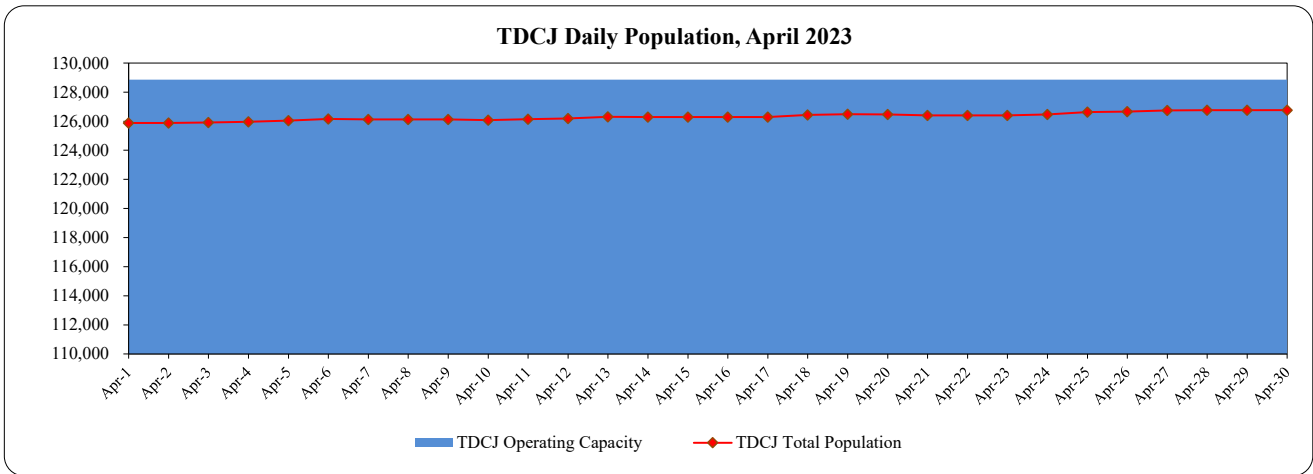

Note: During April 2020, TDCJ temporarily suspended the transfer of individuals into state custody as part of the effort to contain the spread of COVID-19. The transfers resumed in July 2020. Release policies and decisions were not modified during this time period. Individuals are discharged when sentences are completed and released as eligible.

On-line bed capacity reflects the total number of TDCJ beds available for the permanent assignment of individuals incarcerated within state correctional institutions. As of April 2023, 8,814 beds were temporarily removed from on-line bed capacity due to staffing shortages. Also at this time, on-line bed capacity did not include 2,223 temporary placement beds, which include medical (hospital beds and unit-based infirmary beds), transfer holding, and pre-hearing detention beds. Individuals who've received a temporary placement bed also have a permanent bed assigned to them. The total number of Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds at the end of the month was 2,645.

Recent Capacity Adjustments and Other Notes:

- During March 2023, agency capacity was decreased by 64 beds at the Henley Unit due to converting 64 In Prison Therapeutic Community (IPTC) beds to Intermediate Sanction Facility (ISF) beds. Also in March 2023, agency capacity was increased by 144 beds at the Lindsey Unit due to current inmate population trends, bed utilization efforts, and agency needs.
- During February 2023, agency capacity was increased by 184 beds due to the completion of a maintenance project at the Clemens Unit.
- During January 2023, agency capacity was increased by 232 beds. This increase was due to current inmate population trends, bed utilization efforts, and agency needs at the Lindsey Unit (48 beds), and also to the completion of a maintenance project at the Clemens Unit (184 beds).
- During December 2022, agency capacity was increased by 60 beds at the McConnell Unit due to current inmate population trends, bed utilization efforts, and agency needs.
- During November 2022, agency capacity was increased by 204 beds at the Glossbrenner Unit due to completion of a maintenance project.
- During October 2022, agency capacity was increased by 252 beds at the Stevenson Unit and 192 beds at the Lindsey Unit due to current inmate population trends, bed utilization efforts, and agency needs.
- During September 2022, 64 beds at the San Angelo W3 Unit were idled due to staffing shortages.
- During August 2022, 432 beds were added to the Stiles Unit due to current inmate population trends, bed utilization efforts and agency needs.
- During July 2022, a trusty camp was idled at Memorial Unit (321) due to staffing shortages.
- During June 2022, agency capacity was decreased at the Glossbrenner Unit (204 beds) due to a maintenance project.
- During May 2022, agency capacity was decreased at the Telford Unit (432 beds) due to staffing shortages.
- During April 2022, agency capacity was increased at the Bradshaw Unit (256 beds) due to Operation Lone Star.

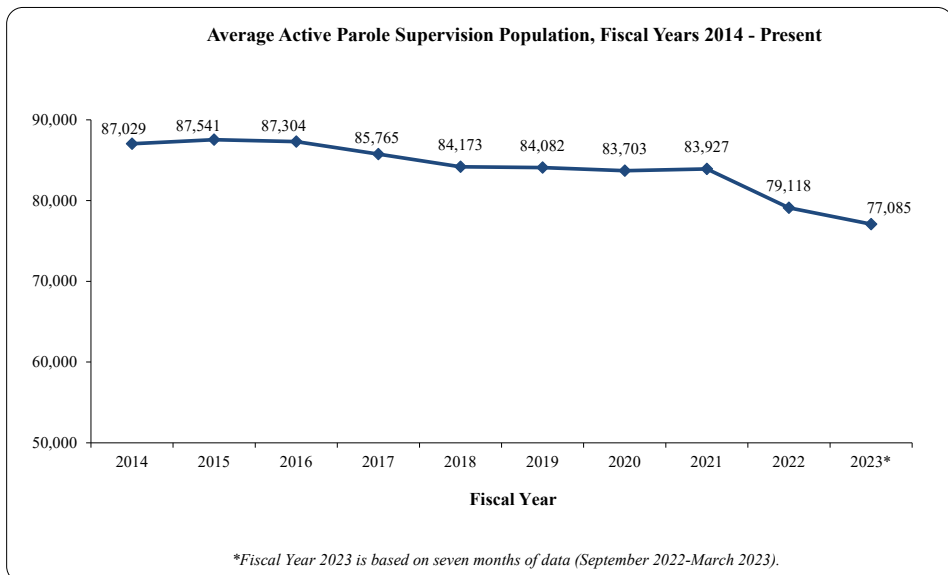

Capacity Adjustments and Other Notes:

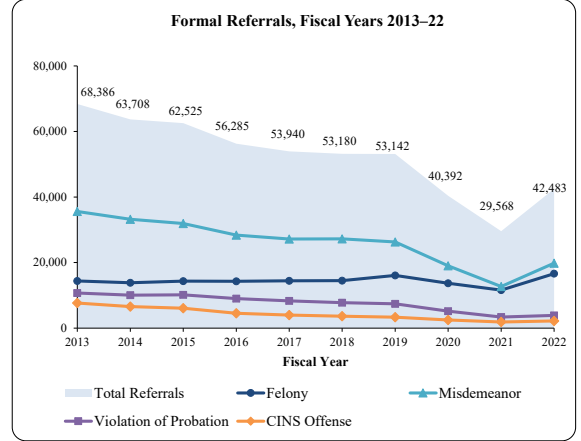
- In February 2023, TJJD operating capacity decreased by 20 beds due to the closure of the Willoughby halfway house.
- In June 2022, TJJD temporarily changed the process for intakes to its secure facilities, citing an inability to maintain compliance with PREA staff ratios and to meet basic supervision needs. No anticipated end date was given.
- As of October 2020, TJJD residential operating capacity includes all online and offline beds in state facilities, and all beds occupied in contract facilities.
- In August 2019, TJJD operating capacity decreased by 24 beds due to the closure of the Cottrell halfway house.
- In June 2018, TJJD operating capacity decreased by 149 beds. This was due to the transfer of the ownership of the Corsicana facility to the City of Corsicana.
- In September 2013, TJJD operating capacity decreased by 319 beds. This was due to the reduction in capacity at the Corsicana facility (49 beds), Giddings facility (46 beds), McLennan facility (120 beds), Ron Jackson I facility (16 beds), halfway houses (40 beds), and contract residential placements (48 beds).

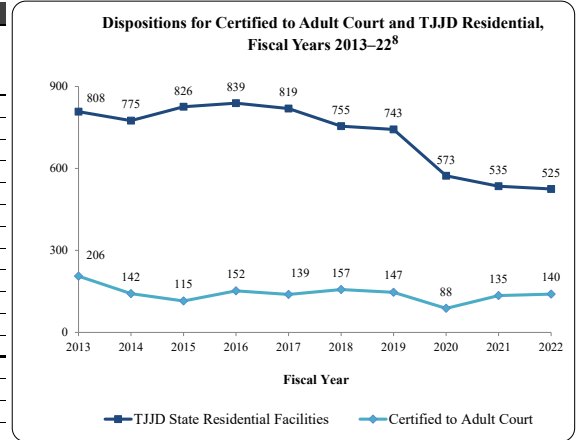

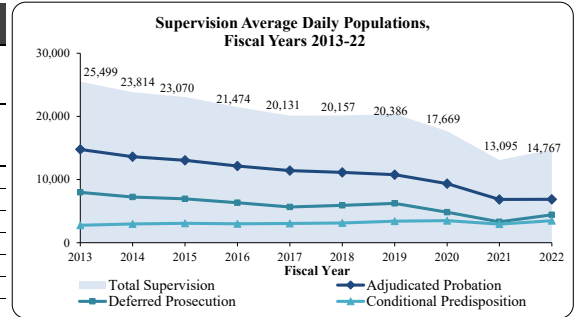

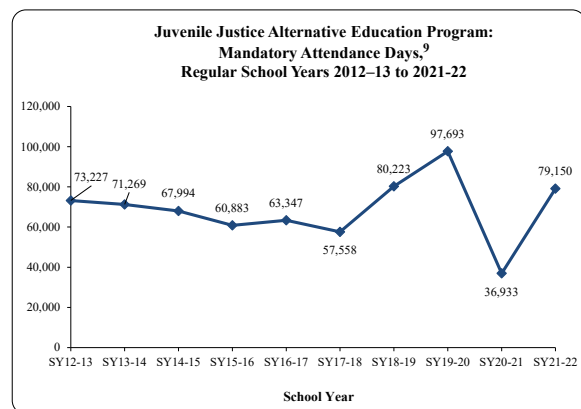

⁴ Numbers may not sum exactly due to rounding.

⁵ A new commitment is a youth committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) for the first time.

⁶ A determinate sentence is a commitment for a specified period of time that is set by the juvenile court and can last up to 40 years in length; those who have not completed their sentence length by their 19th birthday are transferred to the adult system to complete the sentence.

⁷ An indeterminate sentence is a commitment for an unspecified length of time up to the youth's 19th birthday; TJJD has sole discretion over the commitment length.

⁸ Since January 2016, a youth is said to have multiple commitments when there is more than one lawful court order committing him/ her to the TJJD simultaneously. This differs from a recommitted youth, which is a youth who has been *discharged* from a TJJD commitment, usually due to positive completion of the program before age 17, who reoffends and is *committed again* ("recommitted") by a judge with jurisdiction over juvenile court. Prior to January 2016, the term recommitment was used in lieu of multiple commitments.

⁹ Parole revocations reflect the level associated with the alleged offense initiating the parole revocation process.

¹⁰ Other commitments (also referred to as negative movements) are youth who are returned to a state residential facility for medical care, mental health care, or other non-disciplinary reasons. Other commitments can also include youth moved to a secure facility for a court hearings.

¹¹ Total admissions is the sum of total new commitments, total multiple and recommitments, total revocations, and other.

¹² Outliers include youth who had an unusually long length of stay.

Texas Juvenile Justice Department: Probation Supervision Populations

¹ A formal referral occurs when: 1) delinquent conduct, conduct indicating a need for supervision (CINS), or a violation of probation was allegedly committed; 2) the local juvenile probation department has jurisdiction and venue; and 3) face-to-face contact occurs with the department or official designated by the local juvenile board. Juveniles are typically referred to juvenile probation departments by schools and law enforcement but may also be referred by social workers, parents, and others. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.

³ Conduct in Need of Supervision (CINS) is a non-criminal offense for a juvenile and includes public intoxication, truancy, running away from home, fine-only offenses transferred to a juvenile court from a municipal or justice court, inhalant abuse, and expulsion from an alternative school setting for persistent misconduct.

⁴ Dispositions reflect the outcomes of referrals to juvenile probation departments. The dispositions listed do not include consolidated or transferred cases. Adjudicated probation includes all adjudicated dispositions of probation and modifications of probation. Dismissed dispositions include dismissals, findings of not guilty, and findings of no probable cause. Supervisory caution is a non-judicial disposition that may involve such actions as referring the child to a social service agency or a community-based first offender program operated by law enforcement, contacting parents to inform them of the child's activities, or simply warning the child about his or her activities. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information. Figures in the table represent the number of cases, not the number of juveniles. A juvenile may have more than one case in a month.

⁵ Juveniles under conditional predisposition, deferred prosecution, or adjudicated probation supervision may also be on Intensive Supervision (ISP) and/or placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility. ISP is a form of supervision that typically involves smaller caseloads supervised by specially trained probation officers and more frequent contacts between the juvenile and his or her probation officer. Juveniles under deferred prosecution or adjudicated probation supervision may be placed in a secure or nonsecure residential facility.

⁶ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program (JJAEP) table and graph include information associated only with those students receiving a mandatory placement, those for whom the state provides reimbursement, though JJAEPs may accept students referred for discretionary reasons. The number of mandatory attendance days in June and July are low because many schools close in May and others only operate for part of June. The counts in summer school are also typically low because operating a summer school is optional. Historical numbers in this report may be updated to reflect current information.

⁷ Mandatory Attendance Days reflect the sum of the number of days mandatory students attended JJAEPs within the month.

⁸ The graph reflects the number of juveniles certified as an adult and the number of cases sent to TJJD state residential facilities.

⁹ The Juvenile Justice Alternative Education Program graph reflects mandatory attendance days accrued during the regular school year and does not include those accrued during summer school. Since summer school is optional and reimbursement is only available when sufficient funding exists, including only the regular school year renders year-to-year results that are comparable over time.
