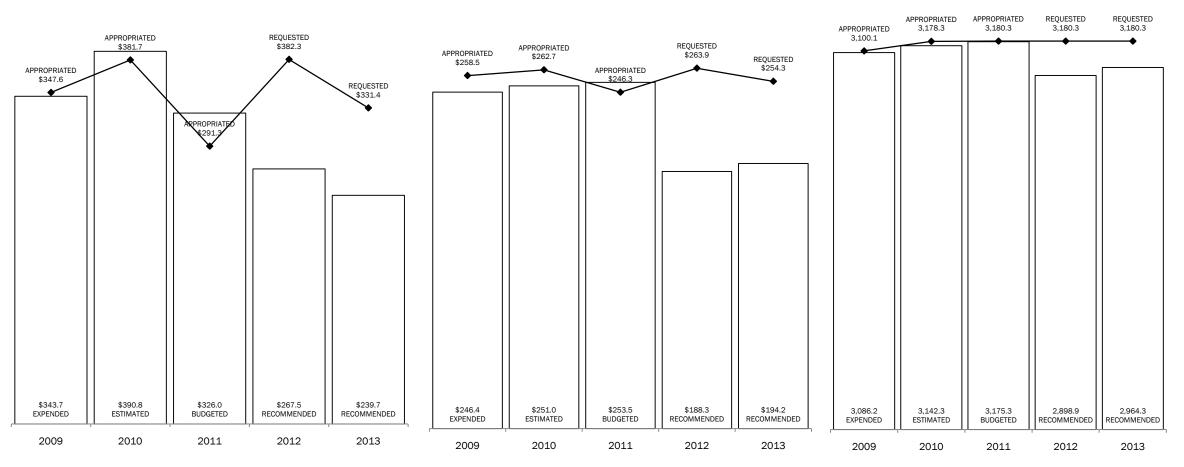

## Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues

Funding in the Introduced Bill begins with the agency's 2010-11 estimated and budgeted amounts and incorporates the following adjustments:

- 1. Decrease General Revenue-Related (GRR) Funds by: \$122,051,842, which includes a) a decrease in General Revenue of \$76,155,646, which includes an agency requested increase of \$3,763,958, offset by a decrease of \$79,919,604; and, b) a decrease in General Revenue-Dedicated (GRD) funds of \$45,896,196, which includes an agency-requested decrease of \$4,415,941, and an additional decrease of \$41,802,255, which includes reductions to the following:
  - a. <u>Capital Improvements and Major Repairs (D.1.1) and Infrastructure Administration (D.1.3), a decrease of \$43,042,645 in GRR accounts from 2010-11 levels, including 21.1 FTEs each fiscal year related to new capital budget construction funded from GRR accounts in 2012-13, which includes:</u>
    - i. A decrease of \$12,584,145 from the General Revenue Fund No. 1 for completed Hurricane Ike –related repairs at Sea Rim and Galveston Island state parks, three other parks, three wildlife management areas, as well as the Sea Center Fish Hatchery in Lake Jackson.
    - ii. A decrease of \$17,124,721 in GRD funds, including the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9 (\$16,710,850), the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$400,962), the Texas Parks and Wildlife Conservation and Capital Account No. 5004 (\$11,480) and the Texas Recreation and Park Account No. 467 (\$1,429), including 11.1 FTEs to defer initiation of new capital budget construction funded from GRR accounts in 2012-13.
    - iii. A decrease of agency-requested increases from GRR accounts in the baseline budget request for capital construction and infrastructure administration (\$12,327,267).
    - iv. <u>Infrastructure Administration</u>: A decrease of \$958,306 from the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9 (\$324,826) and the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$633,480), including 11 FTEs for a 50 percent reduction to the infrastructure design program to reflect the suspension of new construction projects in 2012-13. The remaining \$7.1 million in the D.1.3 strategy, including 55.5 FTEs include funding for program management, customer service, project delivery, and other services.

The Introduced Bill provides \$749,951 in unexpended balance authority from 2011 to 2012 from the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9, primarily to complete the construction of a new conservation building at Sea Center Texas.

b. <u>Local Park and Boating Access, Trail and Other Grants, a decrease of \$24,493,652 in GRR Accounts, including 8.5 FTEs for a 50 percent reduction in program administration and to suspend new local grants awards in 2012-13, which includes: A decrease of \$24,493,652 in General Revenue-Related funds, including General Revenue (\$662,678), the Sporting Goods Sales Tax (SGST) Transfer to the Texas Recreation and Parks Account No. 467 (\$14,114,748) and</u>

the Large County and Municipality Recreation and Parks Account No. 5145 (\$9,716,229) to suspend new local and regional park grants; reduce program administration by 50 percent including 8.5 FTEs; and suspend vehicle purchases (\$25,000). The remaining 8.5 FTEs in Strategies B.2.1, Local Park Grants and B.2.2, Provide Boating Access, Trails and Other Grants would be needed to manage prior year awards, which are allowed a five-year life for acquisition, construction and development. See related federal funds decrease in Selected Fiscal and Policy Issue No. 2(h).

- c. Coastal Erosion Reduction and Transfer to the General Land Office, \$1,466,008 in General Revenue: A decrease of \$1,466,008 from the SGST Transfer to the State Parks Account No. 64 for pass-through coastal erosion grants to the General Land Office (GLO), which funds this item at 94 percent of 2012-13 baseline requested levels (see Rider 24, Coastal Erosion Interagency Contract).
- d. <u>Capital Budget Items</u>, a decrease of \$15,858,086 in GRR accounts to zero-fund replacement cycles for vehicle, tractor, and equipment in the state park system (GR); and vehicle equipment, and information technology equipment replacement cycles in wildlife, fishery, state park, and administrative divisions (GRD), which includes:
  - i. A decrease of \$6,843,420, including the SGST Transfer to the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$4,689,420) and the SGST Transfer to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Conservation and Capital Account No. 5004 (\$2,154,000);
  - ii. A decrease of \$9,014,666 from the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9 (\$6,333,526) and the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$2,681,140).
- e. State Park Reductions, a decrease of \$13,993,745 from GRR accounts, which includes:
  - i. <u>Transfers of 7 State Parks and Closure of Two Regional Offices</u>, a decrease of \$7,733,438 from GRR Accounts, including 76.3 [decreases from the SGST Transfer to the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$4,582,544), the Unclaimed Refunds of Motorboat Fuels Tax (\$1,934,612), the Boat and Boat Motor Sales and Use Tax (\$636,000), General Revenue (\$290,544), and, the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$289,738)]. See related Selected and Fiscal Policy Issue No. 5 for additional information on site transfers and closures.
  - ii. Park Business Development, Cultural and Natural Resources, and Interpretation and Exhibits, a decrease of \$3,971,954 from GRR Accounts, including 19.7 FTEs for a 25 percent reduction to non-priority programs for the park system [decreases from \$2,418,658 from the SGST Transfer to the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$2,418,658) and the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$1,553,296)].
  - iii. <u>Park Minor Repair Program</u>, a decrease of \$2,288,353 in GRR accounts to defer minor repairs in the state park system for 6 months in 2012, including 8.6 FTEs [decreases from the SGST Transfer to the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$6,358) and the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$2,281,995)].

See also Government Effectiveness and Efficiency Report, *Increase Private Support for State Parks*, including new Riders 24 and 25, Contingency Appropriation: Development Revenue and Contingency Appropriation, Donation

Proceeds. These recommendations include reducing \$1,600,000 per fiscal year from the SGST Transfer to the State Parks Account No. 64 and restoring funding with new revenue sources.

Also, due to the recommended reductions in the General Revenue-Dedicated State Parks Account No. 64, the introduced bill includes a method-of-financing swap to replace \$9 million per fiscal year from the SGST Transfer to the State Parks Account No. 64 with funding from the State Parks Account No. 64, see Selected and Fiscal Policy Issue No. 4(a).

- f. Land Acquisition, a decrease of \$13,899,887 from GRR accounts, including 1 FTE, which includes:
  - i. A decrease of \$13,574,132 from the State Park Account No. 64, primarily for the one-time balances of \$9.3 million in proceeds from the sale of Eagle Mountain Lake in 2010-11, including 1 FTE; and, a decrease of \$25,755 from the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9.
  - ii. A decrease of \$300,000 from the SGST Transfer to the State Parks Account No. 64.

The Introduced Bill funds 3 remaining FTEs in this strategy to manage land sales and any acquisition opportunities from cost-neutral exchanges from Appropriated Receipts.

- g. <u>Decrease other General Revenue-Dedicated (GRD)-funded programs by \$10,037,320, including 76.8 FTEs which includes:</u>
  - i. <u>Programs Deferred for 6 Months in 2012</u>: A decrease of \$3,927,014 from GRD accounts, including the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9 (\$2,790,194), the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$801,070), and the Lifetime License Endowment Account No. 544 (\$335,750), including 56.8 FTEs to defer efforts for 6 months in 2012 for the following strategies: Hunting and Wildlife Recreation (A.1.3), Hunter and Boater Education (C.2.1), TP&W Magazine (C.2.2), Promote TPWD Efforts (C.2.3), Outreach and Education (C.2.4). See also corresponding federal funds and Other Funds reductions in Selected Fiscal and Policy Issue No. 2(h).
  - ii. Aquatic Vegetation and Golden Algae Containment Programs, a decrease of \$2,201,222 from GRR accounts, which includes: A decrease of \$1,500,000 in General Revenue for statewide management of aquatic vegetation, which is a 64 percent reduction in this effort from 2010-11 levels (see Rider 19, Statewide Aquatic Vegetation Management); and, a decrease of \$701,222 from the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9 for a 50 percent reduction in efforts to contain Golden Algae statewide.
  - iii. <u>License Buyback Reductions</u>: A decrease of \$2,132,814 from the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9 (\$1,788,114) and the Shrimp License Buyback Account No. 5023 (\$344,700) to suspend crab, finfish, and shrimp commercial licenses buybacks in the 2012-13 biennium.
  - iv. <u>Wildlife Diversity and Research Programs</u>: A decrease of \$1,012,840 from the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9 and \$3,284 from the Non-Game and Endangered Species Conservation Account No. 506, including 20 FTEs for an 8 percent reduction in wildlife research efforts in 2012-13.

- v. <u>License Plate Accounts</u>: A decrease of \$760,166 from license plate accounts, including the Horned Toad, Bluebonnet, Whitetail Deer, and Largemouth Bass accounts within the Texas Parks and Wildlife Conservation and Capital Account No. 5004 (\$583,780); the Big Bend National Park Account No. 5030 (\$70,744); the Waterfowl/Wetland Conservation License Plate Account No. 5057 (\$43,602); the Marine Conservation License Plate Account No. 5142 (\$24,600); the Marine Mammal Recovery License Plate Account No. 5120 (\$19,030); and the Texas Lions Camp License Plate Account No. 5116 (\$18,410) in both agency and pass-through funding to nonprofits from this source, consistent with statewide reductions of 50 percent in appropriations out of license plate accounts. See Rider 14, Appropriation: License Plate Receipts.
- vi. <u>Escrow Accounts</u>: A decrease of \$452,560 from the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9 (\$412,350) and from the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$40,210) to suspend mitigation efforts from escrow accounts in 2012-13.
- h. <u>Agency Administration 15 Percent Reductions</u>, \$7,746,811 in GRR accounts for 15 percent reductions to agency administration programs, including 65.9 FTEs, which includes:
  - i. A decrease of \$9,066 from the SGST Transfer to the State Parks Account No. 64;
  - ii. A decrease of \$7,737,745 from the Game, Fish and Water Safety Account No. 9 (\$4,724,241) and the State Parks Account No. 64 (\$3,013,504.
- i. <u>Law Enforcement Strategies, a net increase of \$1,950,553 from GRR accounts from 2010-11 spending levels, which includes:</u>
  - i. <u>Strategies C.1.1, Enforcement Programs and C.1.3, Law Enforcement Support</u>: An agency requested increase of \$3,772,805 in GRR accounts, including a reallocation of \$1,822,252 from Strategy C.1.2, Texas Game Warden Training Center for cadets in 2010-11 added to Strategy C.1.1, Enforcement Programs.
  - ii. <u>Law Enforcement Training (Strategy C.1.2, Texas Game Warden Training Center)</u>: An agency requested decrease of \$1,822,252 from GRR accounts for a reallocation of 2010-11 training costs for 15 new cadets for the purposes of enhancing border security to Strategy C.1.1, Enforcement Programs.

Increases in the Introduced Bill for the law enforcement strategies noted above and reductions in Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues No. 1(d) for Capital Budget Items (\$3,562,000) net to a total \$1,611,447 decrease and are an overall 1.8 percent reduction to law enforcement strategies compared to 2010-11 levels from GRR accounts, which correspond to 7.3 percent reductions at the Department of Public Safety. **Border Security**: The Introduced Bill continues funding for border security efforts (including 30 FTEs) at 100 percent of 2010-11 funding levels, or \$3.8 million in GRR accounts.

- 2. Decrease Federal Funds by \$70,280,582, which includes:
  - a. <u>Cooperative Endangered Species Conservation</u>: A decrease of \$13,670,388 in pass-through competitive cooperative agreements to universities.
  - b. <u>Hurricane Ike and disaster assistance</u>: A decrease of \$10,860,799 in one-time Hurricane Ike habitat restoration grants, including oyster habitat disaster grants and other disaster assistance.
  - c. <u>Sport Fish Restoration:</u> A decrease of \$6,566,900 in formula funds, primarily for one-time use of matching funds for wildlife and fisher construction projects.
  - d. <u>Wildlife Restoration</u>: A decrease of \$6,250,002 in formula grants for wildlife projects, primarily for a spike in federal funding from this source for increased gun and ammunitions sales, which are now subsiding to normal levels;
  - e. <u>Other Major Categories</u>: A decrease of \$5,386,855 in one-time funds for coastal wetlands planning, boating safety financing assistance, state wildlife grants, and landowner incentive programs.
  - f. <u>Border Security</u>: A decrease of \$2,254,069 in one-time purchases for boats related to border security initiatives
  - g. <u>Artificial Reef Structures</u>: A decrease of \$1,715,337, primarily for one-time pass-through grants from the General Land Office for coastal protection projects.
  - h. Recommendations in the Introduced Bill: A decrease of \$20,590,364 for recommendations in the following programs: a) \$15,896,808 in matching funds to suspend new local and regional park grants in 2012-13; b) \$2,032,248 for an 8 percent reduction in wildlife research efforts in 2012-13; c) \$1,073,462 to defer efforts for 6 months in 2012 for the following strategies: Hunting and Wildlife Recreation (A.1.3), Hunter and Boater Education (C.2.1), Promote TPWD Efforts (C.2.3), Outreach and Education (C.2.4); d) \$721,055 for 15 percent reductions to agency administration programs; e) \$701,222 in matching funds for a 50 percent reduction in Golden Algae containment efforts statewide; f) \$136,050 for park business development, cultural and natural resources, and interpretation and exhibits; and, g) \$29,518 related to the transfer of 7 state parks and the closure of 2 regional offices.
- 3. Decrease Other Funds by \$16,673,548, primarily made up of:
  - a. A decrease of \$12,390,758 in General Obligation Bonds for construction projects;
    Recommendations provide \$8,198,363 in unexpended balances from prior year issuances of GO Bonds carried forward from 2011 to fiscal year 2013 to defer bond project spending for one year for weather-related repairs at Mother Neff State Park (\$5.7 million) and Palo Duro Canyon State Park (\$2.5 million) to generate corresponding debt

service savings at the Texas Public Finance Authority. Related debt service savings from this proposal is estimated to be \$1.1 million. The Introduced Bill provides \$35,952,102 in unexpended balance authority for other bond projects from 2011 to 2012, including the Battleship TEXAS (\$24.7 million); however, debt service savings in the introduced bill would require the deferral of an additional number of these projects.

- b. A decrease of \$3,435,998 in Appropriated Receipts, primarily for donations to the Game Warden Training Center.
- 4. Other Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues
  - a. Sporting Goods Sales Tax (SGST) in the 2012-13 General Appropriations Act: There is a total of \$85.1 million in SGST included in the recommendations, which is 36 percent of the \$251.3 million estimated from this source in the 2012-13 Biennial Revenue Estimate. The attached table reflects the SGST amounts appropriated compared to the statutory maximum for the \$251.3 million estimated.
  - b. <u>Data Center Services Consolidation</u>: The agency submitted a baseline budget request that did not fully fund expected ongoing costs and rate increases associated with the data center contract. The agency requested restoration of \$1,154,319, which represents 2010-11 savings due to natural lapses from implementation delays the agency was able to apply to the five percent reduction requirement. The introduced bill does not include restoration of this item, and instead directs \$1,154,319 from Strategy E.1.2, Information Resources to the Data Center Consolidation capital budget item, which is budgeted at \$8,823,641 for the 2012-13 biennium. Article IX, Section 17.01 of the Introduced Bill makes additional reductions to the Data Center Services project from GRR amounts (\$797,481 for cost of living adjustments and \$89,162 for Department of Information Resources' administrative rates). The resulting 2012-13 budget for the Data Center Services contract is \$7,936,998.

### 5. State Park Transfers and Regional Office Closures

In the 2008-09 biennium, the Legislature directed TPWD to contract with a private vendor to study and make recommendations for the state park system (see Rider 31, State Park System Study in the 2008-09 GAA). One of the findings in the study was that some parks were more suited for management by local public entities. In addition to the seven sites, listed below, two of the eight regional park offices are targeted for closure. Operating budgets for each site recommended to be transferred or closed are shown below:

There are currently 8 regional offices in the state. 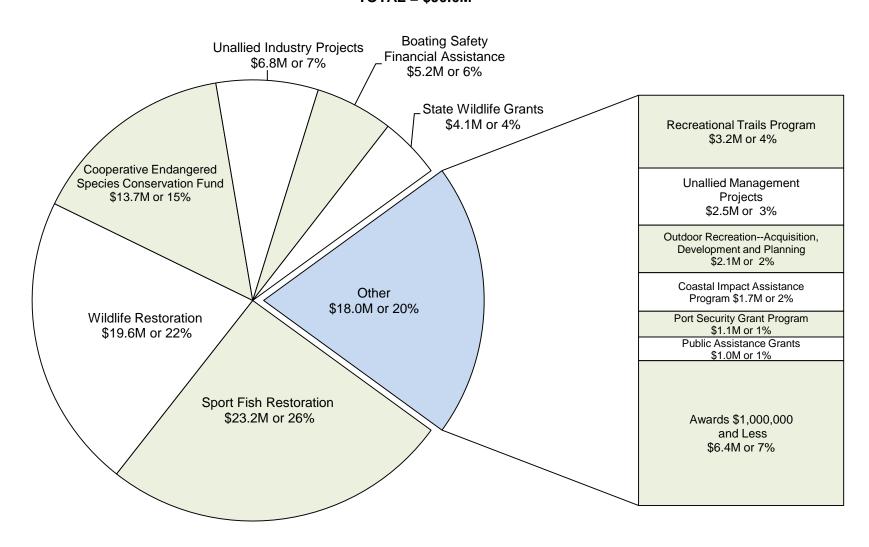
