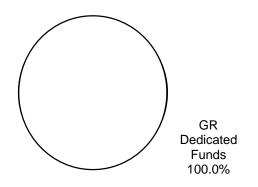

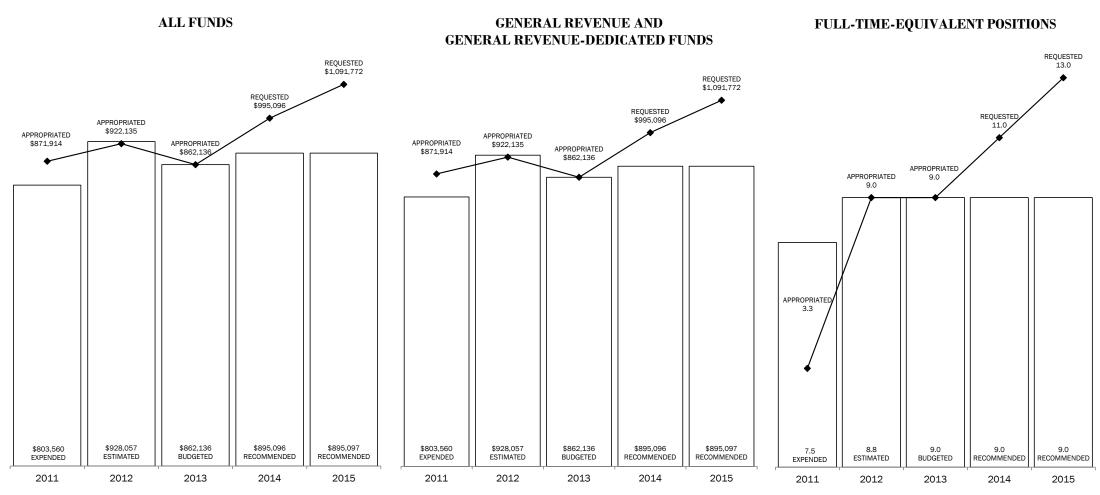

### Office of Capital Writs Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues

1. Caseload and Request for FTE Funding. The Office of Capital Writs (OCW) handles post-conviction habeas corpus proceedings and five attorneys, including the Executive Director, a licensed attorney, are assigned cases. According to the agency, the national average caseload for attorneys performing similar duties (i.e. post-conviction offices in local, state and federal jurisdictions) is four to six cases per attorney. OCW reports that there were 18 proceedings (cases) pending as of August 31,2012. The OCW assigns two attorneys (and an investigator) to each case. Using the reported standard, a caseload of 18 reflects 3.6 appointments/cases per attorney (18 cases / 5 attorneys= 3.6 cases per attorney). However, because OCW assigns two attorneys per case, and makes no distinction between primary and secondary duties for each assignment, the agency's position is that the 18 pending appointments translates into 7.2 appointments/ cases per attorney (18 cases / 2.5 teams of two= 7.2 cases per attorney and team).

In July 2012, the OCW turned down a case stating it was the result of a lack of resources. Texas Government Code, Section 78.054(a)(2) allows the OCW to not accept an appointment under Article 11.071, Code of Criminal Procedure, if the office has insufficient resources to provide adequate representation for the defendant. Absent additional funding above recommended levels, the agency anticipates this trend to continue into the 2014-15 biennium without additional funding, and is requesting two staff attorneys (2 FTEs). Per the OCW standard, this team of two would handle 4-6 cases over the 2014-15 biennium. (See caseload highlights below assuming recommended funding levels).
