


RECOMMENDED FUNDING BY METHOD OF FINANCING

Texas Animal Health Commission Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - Senate

1. **Fee Revenue.** Recommendations include revised rider language appropriating certain fee revenues collected by the agency (see Rider Highlights - Senate #9). The agency currently collects 17 different fees and will collect an estimated \$1,379,634, with \$849,124 retained by the agency, in 2014-15. This amount (\$849,124) is included in the agency's base 2016-17 recommendation. Authority for all but two of the fees the agency collects under Agriculture Code §§ 161.0411, 161.060, and 161.0601 will sunset at the end of FY 2015 without legislative action extending the agency's authority to assess these or similar fees. The agency estimates that the two remaining fees will generate \$1,024,000 in 2016-17. (See also, Item Not Included in Recommendations – Senate, Item #4)

Recommendations appropriate up to \$424,562 each fiscal year from the remaining fees contingent upon revenues being collected to cover these amounts each year. In addition, amounts from these fees that are collected in excess of \$512,000 each fiscal year (the amount contained in the Comptroller's 2016-17 Biennial Revenue Estimate) are also appropriated to the agency. Furthermore, the rider makes an appropriation for any newly created or recreated fee revenue under statutory changes made by the Eighty-Fourth Legislature for the same purpose.

2. **Supplemental Bill Request.** The agency has requested a total of \$1,152,491 from General Revenue in supplemental funding for FY 2015 for expenditures related to two disease events. The agency requested \$860,659 to establish and maintain a quarantine zone in the Rio Grande Valley region for cattle fever ticks. The ticks can be spread by livestock and wildlife, including deer and nilgai, and carry parasites that can result in death rates of up to 90 percent for previously unexposed cattle populations. The agency has also requested \$291,833 for costs related to cattle tuberculosis (TB) outbreaks in two large dairy cattle herds with more than 20,000 total animals in the panhandle region.

The agency's top priority exceptional item includes \$1,188,000 to continue the quarantine zone in 2016. (See also Items Not Included in Recommendations – Senate, Item #1)

- 2. **Capital Budget.** Recommendations continue capital budget authority from the prior biennium in the same amounts for the same purposes. The Acquisition of Information Resource Technologies category is subdivided to reflect purchases for desktop and laptop computers.
- 8. **(Former) Collection of Revenue from Laboratory Testing Fees Applied to Out-of-State Clients.** Recommendations delete this rider. Revisions to Rider 9 will incorporate fees collected and appropriated for the purposes this rider serves should the authority to collect the fees this rider concerns be extended in 2016-17.
- 9. **(Former) Cost Recovery for Animal Health Programs.** Recommendations amend this rider to appropriate all fee revenue collected above the Comptroller's Biennial Revenue Estimate (\$512,000 each year) after appropriations of \$424,562 each fiscal year are covered. The recommendation would also appropriate additional fee revenue contingent upon legislation extending authority currently set to expire at the end of the 2014-15 biennium (see Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues Senate #1).
