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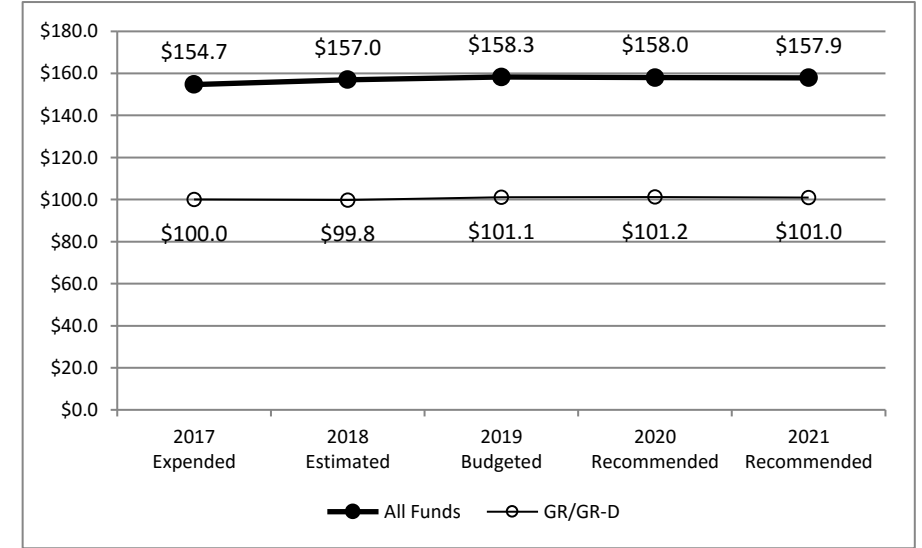

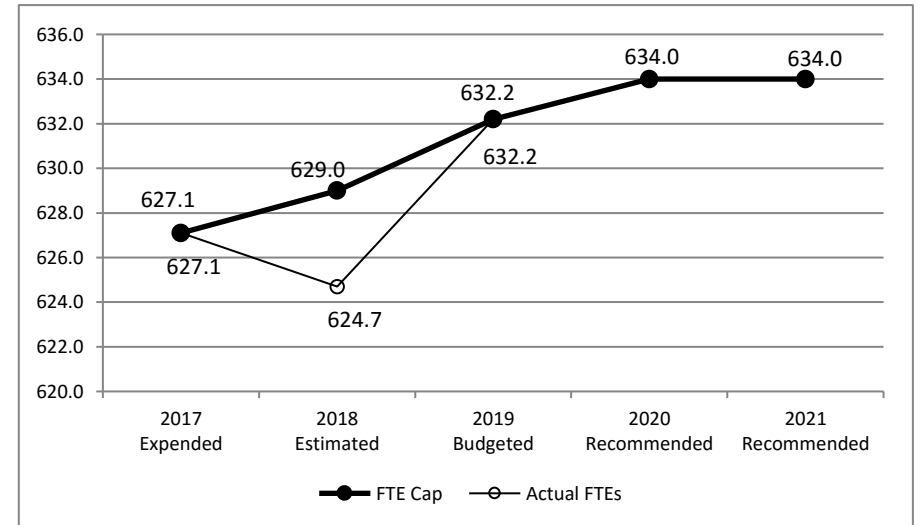

Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - Senate**

1. Biennialize Funding for Court and Prosecutor Changes Due to Enactment of Senate Bill 1329, Eighty-fifth Legislature, 2017

Recommendations biennialize funding for the following:

- a. **District Courts:** an increase of \$980,000 in General Revenue to biennialize costs for five new district courts that were established during the 2018–19 biennium (the 453rd in Hays County, the 459th in Travis County, the 462nd in Denton County, and the 464th and 465th both in Hidalgo County) and for the establishment of the 460th district court in Travis County during the 2020–21 biennium.
- b. **Statutory County Judge Salary Supplements:** an increase of \$294,000 in General Revenue to biennialize costs for three new statutory county courts that were established during the 2018–19 biennium (County Court at Law #6 in Fort Bend County, a County Court at Law In Grimes County, and County Court at Law #3 in Hays County) and for the establishment of County Court at Law #9 in Hidalgo County during the 2020–21 biennium.

2. **Assistant State Prosecutor Fund.** Recommendations include \$8.0 million in Assistant Prosecutor Supplement Fund No. 303 (Fund No. 303) within Strategy D.1.1, Assistant Prosecutor Longevity Pay, \$0.8 million below the 2018–19 spending level, for the reimbursement of counties for longevity pay for eligible assistant district attorneys. Pursuant to Government Code, Chapter 41, every full-time assistant prosecutor is entitled to monthly longevity pay from the state of \$20 per year of service starting in the 5th year with a cap of \$5,000 (which would require 21 years of service). This decrease is due to an anticipated reduction of \$0.4 million per year in revenues to Fund No. 303 from fiscal year 2018 levels as reported in the Comptroller's Biennial Revenue Estimate. In addition, according to the Judiciary Section, \$492,130 will be needed to meet remaining obligations for the 2018–19 biennium for which the Judiciary Section is seeking supplemental funding.

Strategy D.1.1, Assistant Prosecutor Longevity Pay, is funded entirely through Fund No. 303 with revenues drawn from a \$15 fee assessed on every surety bond with a maximum of \$30 per individuals with multiple bonds. Two-thirds of this revenue is deposited to the credit of Fund No. 303 and the remaining one-third is deposited to the credit of General Revenue–Dedicated Fair Defense Account No. 5073. Since the program was established in fiscal year 2001, the number of assistant prosecutors participating in the program has increased while fee revenues have decreased due to more options becoming available that replace the use of surety bonds for pre-trial detention purposes. According to the Texas District and County Attorney Association, it is anticipated that these trends will continue into the 2020–21 biennium and beyond with little chance of reversal.

Government Code, Chapter 41.255(d) specifies that a county is not required to provide longevity supplements if the county does not receive funds from the Judiciary Section for this purpose. In addition, any funding available to the Judiciary Section must be apportioned to counties on an equitable basis resulting in a general across-the-board decrease in longevity pay for assistant state prosecutors.

3. **Docket Equalization Program.** Recommendations include \$5,000 each year, or \$10,000 for the 2020–21 biennium, in General Revenue funding for the Docket Equalization program in a new Strategy D.1.10, Docket Equalization. This program within the Office of Court Administration (OCA) for the 2018–19 biennium pays for travel expenses incurred by appellate justices and their staff who travel to hear cases transferred to them for disposition with OCA staff processing the travel claims in accordance with state travel regulations. Recommendations transfer program responsibility for processing these travel claims to the Judiciary Section, Comptroller's Department because these obligations align closer to the accounting functions of the Judiciary Section.

Judicial and Prosecutor Compensation. Recommendations do not include \$36.2 million in General Revenue funding for a 15 percent increase in a district judge's salary (\$140,000 to \$161,000) and for the salaries of all judicial and prosecutor positions that are statutorily linked to a district judge's salary included as an exceptional item request within the Judiciary Section's LAR for the first time and included at the request of the Judicial Compensation Commission (JCC). In addition, an increase of \$0.8 million in Strategy A.1.2,

Visiting Judge – Regions, and \$54,672 in Strategy A.1.3, Visiting Judges – Appellate, each year, or approximately \$1.7 million total for the 2020–21 biennium, would be necessary to meet increased obligations resulting from statutory requirements that link appointed visiting judge compensation to the compensation of the absent judge.

The total state cost of a 15 percent increase in a district judge’s salary is approximately \$59.6 million which includes salary and salary supplement increases of \$17.0 million for benefits costs for both payroll contributions and increased liabilities due to a higher actuarially sound contribution rate and \$1.7 million for the visiting judge program to maintain judicial appointment rates at 2018–19 levels.

A review of JCC recommendations for judicial salaries and other positions with salaries that are statutorily linked to a district judges salary, and the Commission’s other recommendations is available on page 5. The most recent judicial salary adjustment was a 12 percent increase in the 2014–15 biennium for judge and prosecutor positions linked to district judge pay totaling \$34.8 million across the 2014–15 biennium (See also, Items Not Included in Recommendations - Senate #1).

4. **Judicial and Prosecutor Compensation.** Recommendations do not include \$36.2 million in General Revenue funding for a 15 percent increase in a district judge’s salary (\$140,000 to \$161,000) and for the salaries of all judicial and prosecutor positions that are statutorily linked to a district judge’s salary included as an exceptional item request within the Judiciary Section’s LAR for the first time and included at the request of the Judicial Compensation Commission (JCC). In addition, an increase of \$0.8 million in Strategy A.1.2, Visiting Judge – Regions, and \$54,672 in Strategy A.1.3, Visiting Judges – Appellate, each year, or approximately \$1.7 million total for the 2020–21 biennium, would be necessary to meet increased obligations resulting from statutory requirements that link appointed visiting judge compensation to the compensation of the absent judge.

The total state cost of a 15 percent increase in a district judge’s salary is approximately \$59.6 million which includes salary and salary supplement increases of \$17.0 million for benefits costs for both payroll contributions and increased liabilities due to a higher actuarially sound contribution rate and \$1.7 million for the visiting judge program to maintain judicial appointment rates at 2018–19 levels.

Additional JCC Recommendations:

- 1) Reduce the number of years required to receive judicial longevity pay from sixteen years of service to four years of service and to provide the judge or justice 0.2 percent of their currently monthly state salary for every year of judicial service. If the 15 percent salary increase is authorized then the cost of this recommendation would be \$2.7 million for the 2020-21 biennium and the cost would be \$2.2 million if the 15 percent were not implemented.
- 2) Fund an increase in the salaries of the Children's Court Associate Judges within the Office of Court Administration at 90 percent of a district judge's salary at a cost of \$3.4 million for the 2020-21 biennium if the 15 percent salary increase is authorized.

Notes:

1) The estimated state fiscal impact of a 15 percent judicial salary increase is approximately \$59.6 million for the 2020-21 biennium. This amount includes \$17.0 million in benefits costs, which covers both payroll contributions and increased liabilities due to a higher Actuarially Sound Contribution (ASC) rate and \$1.7 million to maintain visiting judge appointments at 2018-19 levels
