1. **Judicial Education Transfer Authority**. Recommendations relocate subsection (a) of Rider 2, Judicial Education, in the Court of Criminal Appeals bill pattern to Special Provisions – Judiciary in Article IV. Subsection (a) allows the Court to assign the Office of Court Administration or any other agency of the Judicial Branch the necessary administrative and accounting functions for General Revenue-Dedicated Judicial and Court Personnel Training Account No. 540 appropriations to be performed under the direction of the Court. This may include the transfer of the appropriations as directed by the Court.

Recommendations also relocate paragraph 4 of subsection (b) of Rider 2, Judicial Education, which defines administration to include oversight functions, accounting and auditing functions, management studies, performance audits, and other studies initiated by the Court of Criminal Appeals or any other agency of the Judicial Branch (See Also, Section Highlights - Senate #1).

8. **Sec. 8, Judicial Education Funding Transfer Authority**. Recommendations relocate text previously included in Rider 2, Judicial Education, in the Court of Criminal Appeals bill pattern as a technical adjustment because this section gives the Court of Criminal Appeals authority to transfer administrative and accounting functions for General Revenue-Dedicated Judicial and Court Personnel Training Account No. 540 appropriations to the Office of Court Administration or any other agency of the Judicial Branch (See Also, Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - Senate #1).

Deleted Sections

3. **Sec. 3, Judicial Internship Program.** Recommendations delete this section. Individual courts have established a history of compliance with the intent of this provision and have indicated an intent to continue to facilitate internship programs to encourage young lawyers and law students to enter the Judiciary.
