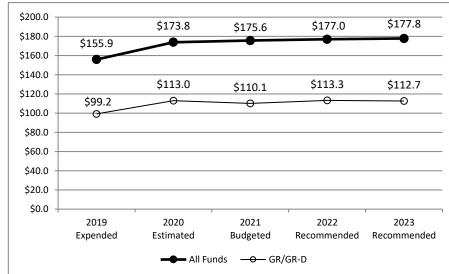

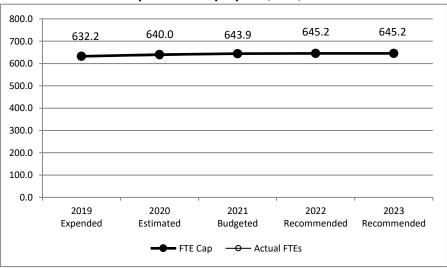

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#### Judiciary Section, Comptroller's Department Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - Senate

- 1. Continue Funding at 2020–21 Spending Levels for Estimated Strategies. Recommendations continue \$8.9 million in General Revenue to maintain \$322.3 million in All Funds for all estimated strategies at 2020–21 spending levels and maintain estimated appropriation authority for all judge and prosecutor compensation strategies, assistant prosecutor longevity pay, county attorney salary supplements, witness expenses, death penalty representation, juror pay, and indigent inmate defense.
- 2. Judge and Prosecutor Compensation Due to Enactment of House Bill 2384, Eighty-sixth Legislature, 2019. Enactment of House Bill 2384, Eighty-sixth Legislature, 2019, adjusted the compensation structure for certain judges and prosecutors by creating tiers of compensation based on years of service, reduced the years of service required for longevity pay for judges or justices from 16 to 12 years of service, and increased the monthly compensation of longevity pay from 3.1 to 5 percent of the judge or justice's monthly salary (see also Rider Highlights Senate #6).

Recommendations continue \$24.0 million in General Revenue appropriated to the Judiciary Section in the 2020–21 biennium to fund the bill's provisions and also provide \$4.6 million in General Revenue to meet state compensation obligations anticipated by the Judiciary Section for the 2022–23 biennium due to current elected judges and prosecutors transitioning into higher compensation tiers. The below table shows state salary and salary supplement amounts by tier for each elected judge or prosecutor impacted by the bill.

- 3. Biennialize Funding for Court and Prosecutor Changes Due to Enactment of Senate Bill 891, Eighty-sixth Legislature, 2019. Recommendations biennialize funding for the following:
  - A. **District Courts:** an increase of \$0.9 million in General Revenue to biennialize costs for four new district courts that were established during the 2020–21 biennium (the 455th in Travis County, the 456th in Guadalupe County, the 466th in Comal County, and the 467th in Denton County).
  - B. **Statutory County Judge Salary Supplements:** an increase of \$0.2 million in General Revenue to biennialize costs for three new statutory county courts that were established during the 2020–21 biennium (Chambers County Court at Law, Gillespie County Court at Law, and County Court at Law #3 in Ellis County).
  - C. **Professional Prosecutors:** an increase of \$0.2 million in General Revenue to biennialize costs for adding the Medina County Criminal District Attorney to the Professional Prosecutors List.
- 4. **Judicial Fund No. 573.** Recommendations continue \$12.8 million in General Revenue drawn down by the Judiciary Section in the 2020–21 biennium to replace unavailable Judicial Fund No. 573 revenues and fund balances for statutorily required compensation to trial judges and local prosecutors and for juror pay through its estimated appropriation authority. Although recommendations in 2022–23 anticipate Judicial Fund collections being sufficient to cover related payroll costs, the Judiciary Section will continue to need estimated appropriation authority from General Revenue to cover any possible shortfall (see also #6 below).
- 5. **Assistant State Prosecutor Fund.** Recommendations provide \$9.3 million in All Funds for longevity pay for eligible assistant district attorneys. This includes an increase of \$0.6 million in General Revenue from 2020–21 spending levels to offset anticipated revenue decreases of a like amount to Assistant Prosecutor Supplement Fund No. 303 (Fund No. 303) for the 2022–23 biennium. Pursuant to Government Code, Chapter 41, every full-time assistant prosecutor is entitled to monthly longevity pay from the state of \$20 per year of service starting in the 5<sup>th</sup> year with a cap of \$5,000 (which would require 21 years of service).
  - Strategy D.1.1, Assistant Prosecutor Longevity Pay, is funded through a mix of General Revenue and Fund No. 303 revenues drawn from a \$15 fee assessed on every surety bond with a maximum of \$30 per individuals with multiple bonds. Two-thirds of this revenue is deposited to the credit of Fund No. 303 and the remaining one-third is deposited to the credit of General Revenue—Dedicated Fair Defense Account No. 5073. According to the Biennial Revenue Estimate, revenues being deposited to the credit of this account are estimated to be \$3.0 million each fiscal year or \$6.0 million for the 2022–23 biennium.
- 6. **Senate Bill 346 and Jury Service Fund.** Enactment of Senate Bill 346, Eighty-sixth Legislature, 2019, increased the consolidated court cost charged for Felony, Class A, and B misdemeanors and made several changes to the revenue distribution of this court cost by changing the percentage distribution of revenue for existing purposes and adding additional purposes to which revenues are directed. These changes impact two funds that are appropriated to the Judiciary Section:
  - A. Judicial Fund No. 573 was added to the list of accounts receiving a portion of the Consolidated Court Cost with a distribution of 12.2667 percent (see also, #4 above). The Judiciary Section estimates \$104.6 million in revenues from this court cost for the 2022–23 biennium deposited to the credit of the Judicial Fund.
  - B. Recommendations provide an estimated \$12.7 million in fiscal year 2022 and \$13.8 million in fiscal year 2023 from Jury Service Fund No. 328 (Jury Service Fund) established through enactment of Senate Bill 346 and provided in Strategy D.1.7, Juror Pay. This includes an additional \$3.2 million in Jury Service Fund revenues anticipated by the Judiciary Section for the 2022–23 biennium that replaces a like amount of General Revenue drawn down by the Judiciary Section in the 2020–21 biennium through its estimated appropriation authority to replace unavailable Jury Service Fund revenues. The Biennial Revenue Estimate anticipates Consolidated Court Cost revenues deposited to the credit of the Jury Service Fund to increase for the 2022–23 biennium. However, recommendations continue estimated appropriation authority to provide the Judiciary Section with necessary flexibility to meet statutory obligations for state funding of juror pay.

#### Section 3

The Jury Service Fund was established as an Other Fund through enactment of Senate Bill 346 to provide juror reimbursements to counties and was added to the list of accounts receiving a portion of the Consolidated Court Cost with a distribution of 6.4090 percent. The 2020–21 General Appropriations Act (GAA) appropriated an estimated \$9.5 million in fiscal year 2020 and \$13.7 million in fiscal year 2021 in contingency funding from the Jury Service Fund associated with the bill's enactment and General Revenue appropriations to the Judiciary Section were also reduced by a like amount.

- 7. **Special Prosecution Unit (SPU):** Recommendations continue \$10.9 million for the Special Prosecution Unit, Walker County which maintains appropriations at the 2020-21 appropriated level. Recommendations do not include a \$0.1 million request for General Revenue funding to cover increases in health insurance costs and other related benefits costs by Walker County that is not included in the Judiciary Section's requests. (See also, Items Not Included in Recommendations Senate #8)
- 8. **Professional Prosecutor Office Apportionment.** Recommendations provide \$8.3 million in General Revenue to fund office expenses for professional prosecutors and the State Prosecuting Attorney at the 2020–21 spending level. Government Code §46.004 entitles state prosecutors to receive at least \$22,500 each fiscal year in state funding to help defray office expenses. Amounts above the statutory minimum are provided to certain judicial districts based on criteria identified in Rider 4. Felony Prosecutors: Expenses that takes into consideration judicial district population. Based on information provided by the Judiciary Section, 161 county and district attorneys and the State Prosecuting Attorney received the supplement in fiscal year 2020 of which 94 received \$27,500 and the remaining 68 received \$22,500.
