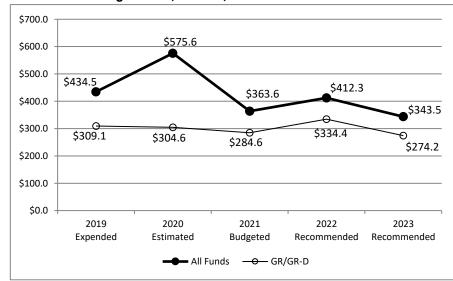

### Agency Budget and Policy Issues and/or Highlights

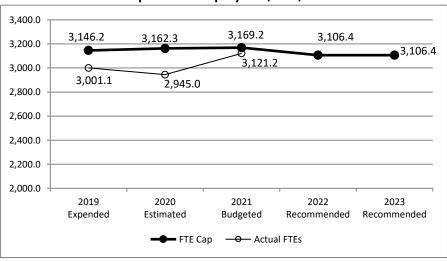
1) Following voter approval of Senate Joint Resolution 24 in November 2019, Sporting Goods Sales Tax (SGST) revenues will no longer count toward certification beginning in fiscal year 2022. Recommendations include \$252.4 million in SGST, which is included in General Revenue Funds in the table above. This amount includes \$18.0 million carried forward from 2021 to 2022. The agency anticipates that 2020-21 expenditures in SGST will total \$216.3 million, which is \$35.2 million less than amounts appropriated.

2) The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department underwent a Strategic Fiscal Review in fiscal year 2020.

## Parks and Wildlife Department Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - Senate

- 1. Removal of One-time Funding: Recommendations include a reduction of \$32.2 million in All Funds for the following one-time expenditures:
  - \$11.9 million in General Revenue for local park grants for specific parks as directed in Rider 37, Local Park Grants;
  - \$7.9 million in Economic Stabilization Funds (ESF) for repairs related to Hurricane Harvey;
  - \$5.0 million in Economic Stabilization Funds (ESF) for the Wyler Aerial Tramway;
  - \$4.0 million in Sporting Goods Sales Tax (SGST) transferred to General Revenue-Dedicated State Parks Account No. 64 and \$0.5 million in Economic Stabilization Funds (ESF) for maintenance and emergency repairs for the Battleship Texas;
  - \$2.4 million in General Revenue for CAPPS Financials implementation and a reduction in the FTE cap of 11.4 FTEs each fiscal year; and
  - \$0.5 million in General Revenue for a grant for the Texas State Aquarium.

The agency reallocated an additional \$13.9 million in one-time expenditure funding from General Revenue and General Revenue-Dedicated Game, Fish, and Water Safety Account No. 9 (GR-D 9) for law enforcement purposes, which are detailed in the table below. See also Rider Highlights – Senate, #2, #37, and #38. See also Items Not Included in Recommendations – Senate, #3 and #4.

- 2. **Sporting Goods Sales Tax**: Recommendations include a total of \$252.4 million from Sporting Goods Sales Tax (SGST) transfers to four General Revenue-Dedicated accounts as outlined in the table below. This amount includes \$18.0 million carried forward from fiscal year 2021 into 2022 and reflects an increase of \$36.1 million, or 16.7 percent, above 2020-21 expenditure levels. The net increase is primarily due to:
  - Prioritizing funding for State Park Operations and Parks Minor Repairs An increase of \$43.4 million in SGST transferred to General Revenue-Dedicated State Parks Account No. 64;
  - Prioritizing Local Park Grants An increase of \$6.9 million in SGST transferred to General Revenue-Dedicated Texas Recreation and Parks Account No. 467 and in increase of \$5.5 million in SGST transferred Large County and Municipality Recreation and Parks Account No. 5150; and
  - Decreased needs in Capital Construction A decrease of \$19.6 million in SGST transferred to General Revenue-Dedicated Parks and Wildlife Conservation and Capital Acct No. 5004 (GR-D 5004).

Recommendations also reserve a total of \$74.0 million for payroll-related benefits and parks-related debt service payments.

The Eighty-sixth Legislature, 2019, enacted two pieces of legislation that made significant changes to SGST that impact TPWD:

- Senate Joint Resolution 24 amended Article VIII of the Texas Constitution to automatically appropriate to TPWD the net revenue received each fiscal year from SGST. The resolution was approved by voters in November 2019, takes effect September 1, 2021, and applies only to SGST collected after that date. Beginning in fiscal year 2022, the amendment precludes SGST from being considered available for certification by the CPA, and
- Senate Bill 1422 amended the maximum SGST allocations to TPWD and the Texas Historical Commission from 94.0 percent and 6.0 percent, respectively, to 93.0 percent and 7.0 percent.

Recommendations amend Rider 15, Informational Listing – Allocation of Sporting Goods Sales Tax (SGST), to align with these constitutional and statutory changes. Additionally, recommendations delete Rider 35, Maximum Appropriation of Sporting Goods Sales Tax (SGST) Revenue, and add its contents to Rider 15. SGST that is collected above the Biennial Revenue Estimate (BRE) will be automatically appropriated to TPWD, and the rider requires that the additional SGST must be allocated into sub-accounts proportionally to amounts appropriated. Recommendations provide authority in Rider 15 for TPWD to request Legislative Budget Board approval to reallocate SGST between the different accounts included in the agency's strategies to provide additional flexibility. This expanded authority would not include authority to request a non-proportional allocation of SGST received above the BRE and would not allow TPWD to request transferring SGST out of capital budget projects. See also Rider Highlights – Senate, #14 and deleted Rider 35. See also Items Not Included in Recommendations – Senate, #2.

The Comptroller of Public Accounts (CPA) Biennial Revenue Estimate (BRE) estimates that SGST available for TPWD will be \$183.1 million in fiscal year 2022 and \$193.3 million in fiscal year 2023, for a total of \$376.5 million for the 2022-23 biennium. This is \$28.7 million above amounts included in the introduced bill for fiscal year 2022 and \$39.4 million above amounts included for fiscal year 2023, for a total of \$68.1 million above the biennial total included in the introduced bill. See also Items Not Included in Recommendations — Senate, #1.

3. General Revenue-Dedicated Method of Finance Swap between General Revenue-Dedicated Game, Fish, and Water Safety Account No. 9 for General Revenue-Dedicated State Parks Acct. No. 64: Recommendations include a method of finance swap between General Revenue-Dedicated Game, Fish, and Water Safety Account No. 9 (GR-D 9) for General Revenue-Dedicated State Parks Acct. No. 64 (GR-D 64). Recommendations include \$228.4 million from GR-D 9, an increase of \$15.6 million compared to 2020-21 levels and recommendations include \$72.3 million from GR-D 64, a decrease of \$13.0 million from 2020-21 levels. The swap offsets GR-D 64 reductions with anticipated SGST increases and increases funding from available GR-D 9 balances for eligible expenditures in capital construction projects and law enforcement. See also Items Not Included in Recommendations – Senate, #5.

GR-D 64 receives revenue from grants, operation of concessions in state parks, certain fines and penalties, certain permit application fees, and allocations from SGST. While the account is not earmarked for specific uses, the CPA reports that the Legislature has generally followed the practice of appropriating account funds for the maintenance and improvement of state parks.

GR-D 9 is used for various purposes, including funding for game wardens not specifically dedicated to border security activities, administration of hunting and fishing license sales, wildlife and fisheries management, and capital projects related to wildlife and fisheries infrastructure. Revenue sources for GR-D 9 include the sales of licenses, stamps, fees, permits and fines regarding game and fish; boat titling and registration fees; sales of marl, sand, shell, gravel, and mudshell; sales of property purchased with GR-D 9 funds; and other various sources.

Although GR-D 9 is a separate account in the General Revenue Fund in the State Treasury that receives the previously discussed revenue collected in Texas, certain revenue streams deposited to the account have statutorily dedicated use restrictions under state and federal requirements. For example, as a condition of receiving federal wildlife and sportfish restoration funding, federal rules (50 CFR 80) requires all states to adopt legislation prohibiting the diversion of hunting and fishing license fees for purposes other than administration of the state's fish and wildlife agency. This includes only those functions required to manage the fish and wildlife-related resources of the state. Parks and Wildlife Code, Sec. 11.033, specifies that the agency may only use the funds in GR-D 9 to manage fish and wildlife resources of the state.

The agency maintains subaccounts for all revenues deposited into GR-D 9 to ensure expenditures are made from allowable sources and comply with laws and conditions established in 50 CFR 80. The table immediately following Section 3, Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues, details these subaccounts, their allowable uses, and the 2022-23 requested appropriated amounts. In the BRE and Cost-Out of the General Appropriations Bills, the CPA does not delineate the subaccounts but makes estimates for the entire account as a whole. This can mask the actual amounts of funds available for general spending due to individual revenue restrictions for the subaccounts. However, the agency monitors revenues deposited to, balances of, and expenditures from these subaccounts closely through its internal accounting system.

4. **Capital Budget Transportation Items**: Recommendations divide the agency's existing capital budget project titled Capital Transportation into two separate projects to increase transparency: Capital Transportation – Vehicles and Capital Transportation – Other. TPWD's current capital budget project includes vehicles as well as non-vehicles such as boats and all-terrain vehicles.

Recommendations provide \$17.8 million in General Revenue and General Revenue-Dedicated funds for Capital Transportation – Vehicles, which fully funds the agency's request. This funds replacement of 165 vehicles that are above 150,000 miles and ten or more years of age and 290 law enforcement vehicles.

Recommendations include a method of finance swap to remove all General Revenue from the request (\$3.8 million) and replace it with GR-D 9 funds of an identical amount. This will provide the funding necessary to replace all vehicles while preserving General Revenue funds. To partially offset the increase in GR-D 9 funds, recommendations reduce GR-D 9 funding by \$3.0 million in Strategy A.2.3, Coastal Fisheries Management, Habitat Conservation, and Research, to return funding to the 2020-21 base level.

Recommendations provide \$3.3 million in General Revenue and General Revenue-Dedicated funds for Capital Transportation – Other, including funding to replace 11 law enforcement boats. Recommendations do not include the agency's request for a new law enforcement helicopter (\$5.8 million in General Revenue) or a new research vessel (\$0.6 million in GR-D 9). The agency requested the helicopter during the Eighty-sixth Legislature, 2019, but the Legislature did not include funding for that purpose. See also Rider Highlights – Senate, #2. See also Items Not Included in Recommendations – Senate, #1 and #3.

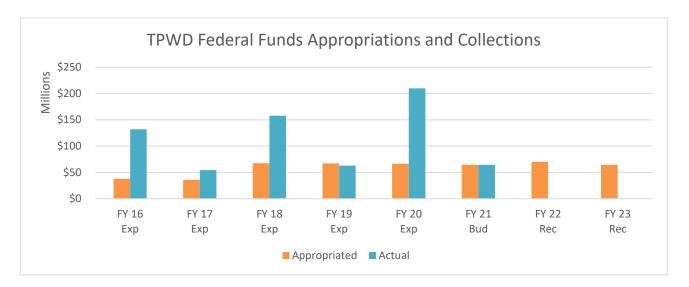
5. **Battleship TEXAS**: Recommendations modify Rider 34, Contingency for Senate Bill 1511, to change the name to Battleship TEXAS, to delete language pertaining to appropriations made by the Eighty-sixth Legislature, and to appropriate to TPWD all funds collected from operation of the Battleship so that TPWD may transfer funds to the Battleship Texas Foundation (BTF), which has assumed control of the ship pursuant to enactment of the legislation. Senate Bill 1511, Eighty-sixth Legislature, required TPWD to submit semi-annual reports to the Legislative Budget Board, Governor's Office, and CPA regarding the project. Recommendations retain this portion of the rider.

Senate Bill 1511 directed TPWD to enter into a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with a non-profit organization for operation and maintenance of the ship. TPWD entered into an MOU with BTF in August 2019. The rider directed \$4.0 million appropriated in TPWD's 2020-21 bill pattern to be used by TPWD for operation and repairs to the ship until such time as the agency entered into a MOU. The Legislative Budget Board approved a transfer of funds to BTF in August 2019, when the restoration plan was approved by the Legislative Budget Board. The pandemic has slowed repair of the ship, which is currently still in the Port of Houston, but TPWD expects to award a repair contract in December of 2020, and to tow the ship to a shipyard for repair in the Spring of 2021. TPWD has confirmed that repairs will not exceed the \$35.0 million appropriated by Senate Bill 500, Eighty-sixth Legislature.

Recommendations include a decrease of \$4.5 million in All Funds (\$4.0 million in General Revenue and \$0.5 million in Economic Stabilization Funds) related to the Battleship Texas. Additional appropriations for the Battleship were not requested and are not included in recommendations. TPWD estimates that the Battleship will be repaired and open to the public under BTF's management during the 2022-23 biennium. See also item #1 above. See also Rider Highlights – Senate, #34. See also Items Not Included in Recommendations – Senate, #9.

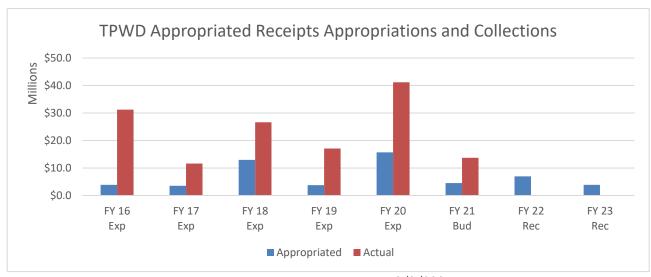
6. **Federal Funds**: Recommendations include \$134.6 million in Federal Funds, which aligns with the agency's 2022-23 request and is \$139.8 million below 2020-21 spending levels. The decrease is related to the agency's expenditure of federal grant allotments in 2020-21 from previous years. The agency has three years to expend federal grants for allowed expenses. The agency utilized appropriation authority provided in Article IX, Sec. 13.01, Federal Funds/Block Grants, to exceed the 2020-21 appropriated levels.

The agency typically includes only Federal Funds amounts in its Legislative Appropriations Request that are known to be available at the time it submits its request, which has consistently resulted in higher actual amounts of Federal Funds being received during a biennium than were appropriated. The figure below reflects this trend.



7. **Appropriated Receipts:** Recommendations include \$10.8 million in Appropriated Receipts, which aligns with the agency's 2022-23 request and is \$44.1 million below 2020-21 spending levels. This decrease is due to the agency's methodology of only including anticipated amounts in its Legislative Appropriations Request rather than estimating amounts based on prior years. As with Federal Funds, this typically results in amounts received far exceeding amounts appropriated, as shown in the figure below.

Article IX, Sec. 8.01, appropriates gifts of money received above appropriated amounts. In its request, the agency indicates a decrease of \$19.3 million related to this category. Article IX, Sec. 8.02, appropriates certain reimbursements and payments (including legal settlement proceeds) received above appropriated amounts. The agency indicates a decrease of \$13.1 million in this area. Programmatically, the largest reductions in 2022-23 are in Artificial Reef (\$12.2 million), Construction and Major Repairs (\$9.0 million), Land Conservation (\$8.9 million), Wildlife Conservation (\$3.1 million), and State Park Operations (\$3.1 million).



- 8. New Rider for the Managed Lands Deer Program (MLDP): Recommendations include a new Rider 35, Appropriation: Managed Lands Deer Program Participation Fees, that identifies revenues generated by the MLDP, restricts use of revenues to support the program, and provides unexpended balance authority within the biennium for the revenue. Recommendations do not include the agency's request for unexpended balance authority between biennia or for authority to use the funds outside the program. Landowners enrolled in the program may take advantage of extended hunting season lengths and liberalized deer harvest opportunities. Senate Bill 733, Eighty-sixth Legislature, authorized the agency to establish and collect a fee for participation in the MLDP. Revenues collected from the fee are deposited to the credit of GR-D 9 and the amounts projected to be collected from participating landowners are appropriated to TPWD. See also Rider Highlights Senate, #35. See also Items Not Included in Recommendations Senate, #7.
- 9. New Rider for the Oyster Mariculture Program: Recommendations include a new Rider 36, Appropriation: Oyster Mariculture Fees, that identifies appropriated revenues estimated to be generated by the Oyster Mariculture program, specifies allowable uses of the revenue, and provides unexpended balance authority within the biennium for the revenue. Senate Bill 1300, Eighty-sixth Legislature, directed TPWD to develop a program to regulate cultivated oyster mariculture, or the process of growing cultivated oysters, and to assess a fee for participation in the program. See also Rider Highlights Senate, #36. See also Items Not Included in Recommendations Senate, #8.
- 10. **Border Security**: Recommendations continue \$29.0 million in All Funds in Strategy C.1.1, Enforcement Programs, for Border Security-related activities. This continues 2020-21 funding levels, but includes a method of finance swap that reduces General Revenue Acct. No. 8016, Unclaimed Refunds of Motorboat Fuel Tax, by \$2.1 million, offset by increases in General Revenue of \$0.7 million, in GR-D 9 of \$1.1 million, and in Federal Funds by \$0.3 million.
  - Recommendations provide funding for 90 game wardens conducting law enforcement, water safety, and search and rescue in border counties and 49 game wardens dedicated to enhanced border security and relevant equipment. According to the agency, game warden deployments are on a rotational basis and game wardens dedicated to enhanced border security activities would continue conducting general law enforcement activities as well. See also Rider Highlights Senate, #13.
- 11. Local Park Grants. Recommendations provide \$48.0 million in All Funds (\$24.9 million in General Revenue and General Revenue-Dedicated funds) in Strategies B.2.1, Local Park Grants, and B.2.2, Boating Access and Other Grants. These amounts reflect a decrease of \$56.3 million in All Funds from the 2020-21 spending levels. The overall decrease is primarily due to the agency spending its Federal Funds allotments from previous fiscal years while only including confirmed awards in its request (see item 5 above) and the removal of one-time grant funding for the Texas State Aquarium (\$0.5 million) and for multiple parks listed in former Rider 37, Local Park Grants (\$11.9 million), offset by an increase in SGST transfers of \$12.4 million.
  - TPWD provides grants to local units of government and other entities for outdoor recreation development. The demand for grants is greater than the amount available in each biennia and applying local entities generally need to match the federal and state grant funds with local resources. See also item #1 above. See also Rider Highlights Senate, deleted Rider 37. See also Items Not Included in Recommendations Senate, #1.
- 12. **Strategic Fiscal Review**: The agency is currently under Sunset review, and as a result is subject to the Strategic Fiscal Review process outlined in Senate Bill 68, Eighty-sixth Legislature. Historical program and financial information was collected and analyzed to inform the budget process. Significant findings are outlined in the report, but highlights include:
  - There are currently more than 30 state park sites without designated interpretive staff positions to explain the meaning and significance of natural and cultural resources at parks, which reduces the capacity for outreach, education, and awareness. Additional funding for exhibits, support specialist staff, and equipment could increase State Parks Visitor Services program effectiveness and support visitors with disabilities. Recommendations include the agency's request for an additional \$1.0 million in All Funds in the program.

#### Section 3

- Appropriated revenues and unexpended balances from oyster shell recovery and cultch replacement receipts are not being spent for the purpose for which they are collected each biennium due to the second fiscal year ending before the funds can be encumbered. Recommendations include unexpended balance authority between biennia to address this issue. See also Rider Highlights Senate, #26.
- New rider language in the General Appropriations Act could increase flexibility for the agency in spending SGST funds by enabling the agency to seek approval to reallocate and reprioritize SGST appropriations in TPWD's budget during a biennium. Recommendations provide this authority in the modified SGST rider. See item #2 above. See also Rider Highlights Senate, #14.
- 13. **Sunset Review**: The agency is currently under Sunset Review and will be abolished on September 1, 2021 unless continued by the Eighty-seventh Legislature, 2021. - 10. Payments to License Agents, Tax Assessor Collectors, and License Vendor. Recommendations amend the rider to clarify the sources of appropriated receipts used for payments to the license sales system vendor.
- 13. **Border Security.** Recommendations modify the methods of finance in the rider, while maintaining the same overall totals. See also Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues Senate, #10.
- 14. Informational Listing Allocation of Sporting Goods Sales Tax (SGST). Recommendations amend the rider to reflect changes made by voter approval of Senate Joint Resolution 24, which appropriates the full amount of SGST collected by the state to be appropriated to TPWD and the Texas Historical Commission. Recommendations also add the contents of former Rider 35, Maximum Allocation of Sporting Goods Sales Tax (SGST) to the rider.
